How are you going to convince the reader to see what you see?

Introduction	 Hook Write a few sentences with details to help introduce your topic. Often (but not always), the thesis is the last sentence of the introduction. Sample thesis: "The short story "The Lottery" demonstrates the power of tradition and ritual in society even if that tradition or ritual is unfair or unjust."
Point One	Support of Thesis Clear topic sentence makes sure it relates to your writing task. Introduce your topic further. Use a quote or other examples. Identify and explain the example you just gave. Explain how it relates to real life (if needed) Transition to the next topic.

Conclusion	Restatement of the thesis (in different words) or review of key points Sample re-worded thesis: "Today, "The Lottery" is a reminder that people need to stand up for what they believe in and not just follow unfair traditions and rituals that have been passed on for generations." • Wrap up your ideas on the topic • Leave your reader with a final thought or question Sample final question: "If we as a society had never fought for women to vote, or never spoke out against discrimination, how would we be living today?"

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
